





¹Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. ²You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. ³ Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." ⁴ And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." ⁶ Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons.

⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." 





All are welcome to join the **Page Turners' Book Club** on the first Thursday of the month during the academic year. We will consider the novel "Bel Canto" by Ann Patchett on February 6th at noon in the Campus Center Library. You are welcome to join us; bring your lunch if you'd like. Our goal is to include both fiction and nonfiction. Come for one discussion or several.

Here are some of the titles we will be discussing in early 2025:

February 6, 2025: "Bel Canto: A Novel" by Ann Patchett (2001) (Pat)

Art, culture, and characters from different countries are the main ingredients of this novel set in a small South American country. Katsumi Hosokawa, a wealthy Japanese businessman and devotee of opera, is invited to a party featuring well-known opera singer, Roxanne Koss. The goal is to win Hosokawa's favor so he may provide financial investment into the country. Just as Koss finishes her finale, the lights go out, and the room is stormed by a group of young terrorists. Unfortunately, the person they sought was the president of the country, who decided to remain at home and watch a soap opera. What takes place between the hostages and their captors over several months is the story. Aside from the fear of those kidnapped, the tenuous lives of the terrorists are always hanging as a shadow in the background. "Bel Canto" means "beautiful song". ~ Pat Carper, Leader

March 6, 2025: "81 Days Below Zero: The Incredible Survival Story of a World War II Pilot in Alaska's Frozen Wilderness" by Brian Murphy (2015) (Gerry & Jean)

Shortly before Christmas in 1943, five Army aviators left Alaska's Ladd Field on a routine flight to test their hastily retrofitted B-24 Liberator in harsh winter conditions. The mission ended in a crash that claimed all but one—Leon Crane, a city kid from Philadelphia with no wilderness experience. With little more than a parachute for cover and an old Boy Scout knife in his pocket, Crane now found himself alone in subzero temperatures. Crane knew, as did the Ladd Field crews who searched unsuccessfully for the crash site, that his chance of survival dropped swiftly with each passing day. (Amazon description)

RECONCILINGWORKS MUTUAL AID FUND

In December 2024, ReconcilingWorks launched a mutual aid fund to provide support and assistance to LGBTQ Lutherans. "Mutual aid" is defined as a community working together to collectively support each others needs, especially where other social safety nets have left gaps. ReconcilingWorks's mutual aid fund has been set up to support LGBTQ families and individuals in our congregation and ministries. Specifically, these funds will help people with processes like legal name changes, document updates, and adoption proceedings, where cost can be a barrier. Applicants are eligible to receive up to \$500 (depending on their needs and situation), and the decision committee meets bi-weekly.
